About Us

The St. John Feral Fund **is not a shelter**. We *do not pick up animals*, but do provide information on shelters and resources such as low-cost veterinary services to concerned citizens.

We are a not-for-profit organization that advocates non-lethal feline population control.

We raise public awareness by providing the public with information on feral and stray cat issues, including controlling populations within colonies via Trap-Neuter-Return (TNR).

To accomplish our work, we conduct fundraising events to support local initiatives for these cats and kittens.

How We Have Helped

The St. John Feral Cat Fund has spayed and neutered over **2,500** cats and found homes for over **1000** cats and kittens since it was founded in July of 2002.

In 2011, we rescued over 270 animals.



Local Trap/Neuter/Return

The St. John Feral Cat Fund began the first Trap/Neuter/Return program in July 2002, in response to complaint calls regarding feral and homeless cats.

What is TNR?

TNR is a full-management plan employed throughout the country to manage feral cat populations. Under TNR, stray and feral cats already living outdoors in cities, towns and rural areas are humanely trapped, evaluated, vaccinated, sterilized and ear tipped for identification by veterinarians.

What Happens to the Cats?

With help from volunteers, when foster homes are available, kittens and tamed cats are socialized and adopted into good homes. Healthy adult cats too wild to be adopted are returned to their familiar habitat under the lifelong care of volunteers.

Why is TNR Effective?

As a result, cats' lives are spared, their living conditions improve, and their numbers decrease over time. It is a humane and more cost effective solution than euthanasia, which creates a vacuum in colonies and is self-defeating.



Feral Cat Myths and Facts

Please review the following myths and facts about feral cats, courtesy of Alley Cat Allies (www.alleycat.org).

MYTH: Feral cats can be eradicated by trapping and killing.

FACT: Many decades of eradication campaigns have done nothing to reduce the numbers of stray and feral cats

MYTH: Feral cats present a high risk of spreading rabies.

FACT: Rabies in the U.S. is overwhelmingly a disease found in wildlife. Feral cats do not spread rabies among humans or other animal groups.

MYTH: Feral cats are sickly and diseased.

FACT: Scientific studies show that feral cats in managed colonies generally enjoy the same good health, and low occurrence of disease enjoyed by companion cats.
